Thank You For Your Support Last Thursday

Going on strike last week is not something that I enjoyed doing. I'm sure if you asked any teacher, they would tell you the same. However, we haven't done it on a whim. During the day and the days that followed, I read lots of articles and comments from people around both Nelson and New Zealand. There were many, many comments that supported teachers. But there were some comments made that were disappointing and inaccurate.

All jobs are different. All jobs are varied and have their own intricacies. Teaching is a great job. It is a wonderful opportunity to work with people young and old and the reason I went into teaching was because I considered it an occupation where I could make a real difference. This reason for me has not changed. However, the job has. It has become a complex juggle of political and societal balls that often detract from the ability to teach. Over previous years, the numbers applying to become teachers has dropped. We are also seeing a number of teachers leaving the profession. We also have approximately 20% of the teacher work force who are about to retire. This is and will, leave NZ with a considerable issue around ensuring there are enough teachers. The government has recognised this although belatedly, and is rushing to bring in teachers from overseas. There are some issues with this however. Who will mentor the new overseas teacher, to bring them up to speed with curriculum, Treaty of Waitangi requirements etc etc? Teachers are struggling with their own day to day workloads. They certainly don't require the job of getting someone else up to speed.

The media and some people conveniently view the current industrial action as teacher greed. However, when all is considered one has to ask why people are not opting to become teachers. If the pay and holidays are so good, why aren't people lining up to become teachers? It is because these aspects of teaching are not attractive. When we talk about the desire to increase pay rates it is so it is an attractive profession. It is not about our greed but the desire to attract suitable people into teaching to do the best for children.

As we continue through this round of negotiations, other sectors are saying the same things. The government announced earlier this week that all ECEs would be staffed with 100% fully qualified staff. This is a wonderful dream but they are struggling for staff as it is now. Where are all these extra staff going to come from?

In our negotiations we have sought other aspects to enable us to better do our job. One such aspect is the opportunity to have a SENCo (Special Education Needs Coordinator) attached to each school as at present this position is held by a staff member who adds it to her list of things to do. The government's response to this was to say they would supply 600 SENCos across the country. There are 2 issues with this: 1. There are approximately 2500 primary schools across the country. Therefore how does 600 go into 2500? 2. Where will 600 SENCos come from. There is aready a teacher shortage.

The issue for teachers such as myself is that I joined the profession to make a difference. And to be fair, I think as a school we do a great job. However, the teachers' good-will will only stretch so far and I think we are about to find out where that point is.


